Why is there a Champion's network?

Research tells us that victims of Domestic Violence and Abuse (DVA) can go to as many as five different agencies before they find appropriate help, advice and support. By having Domestic Abuse Champions with increased awareness of the problems and of local services, the aim is to dramatically reduce this number and ensure early intervention.

Champions will be able to advise their colleagues on management of individual cases and ensure that they are aware of (and have access to) local resources and support.

Agencies have strategic and operational obligations towards DVA and safeguarding victims. Having a champion(s) within your organisation or service is vital in supporting these obligations.

What is the Champion's role?

- You will be the DVA contact for your organisation/service area.
- You will cascade DVA awareness to your organisation/service area.
- Champions on the frontline within their profession can identify victims and refer them to local resources and support.
- You will be the link between your organisation/ service area and other Champions.
- You will be kept up to date on DVA issues so as to cascade this to other colleagues.
- You will have the opportunity to attend DVA network meetings in order to meet other Champions from other professions to expand your knowledge as well as share best practice.

Which representatives have joined the network?
